


Siloam's Ministry of Giving (2 Corinthians 8:6)

The contents of a food parcel which was distributed last May after the 'Covid-19' pandemic made it impossible for them to be distributed before Christmas. You will notice that there is no 'bacalhau' codfish Christmas delicacy as it was not seasonally relevant. Other groceries made up for that omission.

A letter of thanks from the Senior Pastor Jorge Jacinto of the Igreja Filadélfia situated in north Lisbon. His letter explains that the 150 parcels of groceries were distributed to

the poor families where the church has influence for which the locations are listed on the fourth paragraph. *

Dear faithful Siloam friends and investors

Although we have heard a little from our news media concerning Portugal during most of the 'Coronavirus' pandemic, recent reports confirm that there are actually less infections in Portugal now than there are sadly here in the UK.

But, around 400,000 people in Portugal have fallen below the poverty line defined as being 60% of the equivalent average income stated as \notin 9,100. Indeed, before the 'Covid-19' crisis, the average income was only \notin 10,100 per year which is one of the lowest in the EU.

Also, the 'Covid-19' crisis had a disproportionate effect on the lower to middle income groups who were the most affected by this crisis. According to a recent study, most of the people affected by 'Covid-19' were already in the lower half of the income distribution group which caused inequality to increase. In fact, the pandemic led to a staggering 25% increase in poverty over just one year which jeopardised the progress made over the last 20 years, which was slowly reversing the trend of continued poverty. Since 2015, the poverty rate was still high by most standards though being 19% of the average income.

We are indebted also to Elisa, Pastor Oscar's wife (right) who has helped on many occasions to put these Christmas food parcels together as a practical expression of Christian love.



Tourism is one of the important sources of income for Portugal's economy and this was devastated during 'Covid-19' periods of 'lockdown.' The restrictions made by the strict Portuguese government did however save people from the more detrimental health effects of 'Covid-19' but this in fact devastated Portugal's fragile economy. Most people who were in the hospitality trade lost their jobs as all the restaurants, hotels and bars closed. There were very strict travel restrictions for people travelling from home to work and you could only travel if you had a travel permit! Those that did not have permits were fined and people were penalised if they did not obey the government's ruling. People in Portugal are far more compliant with government regulations than they are here in the UK because many remembered the period of dictatorship where many freedoms did not exist. Unlike here in the UK, people did not tend to argue or challenge the authorities' instructions to isolate or wear masks. Remember the English football supporters in North Portugal!!

The result of 'Covid-19' pandemic meant

apartments. Many others were made homeless as they were unable to pay the rents which are now increasing. Many people were made even poorer because of loss of employment and in some cases the death of the 'breadwinner.'

Siloam's Christmas parcel outreach planned for Portugal last Christmas was actually delayed because of the travel restrictions which would have made an earlier distribution impossible. But, 150 food parcels were actually distributed in May 2021 to poor families living near the Igreja Filadélfia

through whom Pastor Oscar Segura organised our food parcel distribution.

The food parcels were indeed a 'life saver' to 150 families who would not have had this provision had not our Siloam supporters made that distribution possible.

This year we are hoping that our Christmas parcel outreach will take place shortly before Christmas so that we can use the opportunity to celebrate the birth of our Saviour Jesus Christ which will have a double benefit upon the grateful recipients. If we can explain the simple message of the gospel while at the same time providing a tangible expression of Christian love during the nativity season, we know that this will touch hearts and make people consider their eternal destiny. Please look at the photos and enjoy the smiling faces behind the masks of the grateful recipients who would otherwise not have enjoyed this token of our supporters' generosity, had we not been able to help them.

This Christmas we are planning to distribute another 150 food parcels to poor people in Portugal for which we require a total of £3,000. Each food parcel will cost roughly £18 plus transport costs so if you would like to invest with us again this winter, we will be sure to make Christmas happier and more enjoyable for at least 150 poor Portuguese families.

Christmas parcel outreach to Guinea-Bissau



In addition to this Christmas parcel outreach which we hope will go ahead 'Covid-19' restrictions allowing, in which this Christmas we plan to include the Portuguese delicacy of salted codfish 'bacalhau' which is very important for Portuguese people as they celebrate with a meal on Christmas Eve; we are also reaching out to Guinea-Bissau in Africa.

In November, Siloam forwarded €1,000 to Pastor Oscar Segura to help him pay for a Christmas food parcel outreach to his missionary friends in Guinea-Bissau, a desperately poor former colony of Portugal where Pastor Oscar Segura served his military national service as a young

man. Pastor Oscar Segura was very motivated to explain the life-changing gospel message of Jesus Christ so he was responsible tor setting up a small missionary church which he still occasionally visits to encourage as funds permit.

Although he has not visited Guinea-Bissau for sometime because of the 'Covid-19' restrictions, the gift of

'Covid-19' restrictions, to food parcels which will be distributed by his African co-workers whom we know will be very grateful. These funds have been taken from Siloam's reserves to meet this important timely need as an extension of our Christian love."
